



KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Voting is a fundamental right, and therefore, it is important to understand your voting rights.

General Voting Rights:

- You must be a U.S. citizen.
- You must be at least 18 years old by Election Day.
- You must be a resident of Kansas and have lived at your current address for at least 21 days before Election Day.

Voting Rights for People with a Criminal Record:

- In Kansas, individuals with a felony conviction lose their right to vote while incarcerated or on parole. Voting rights are reestablished once their sentence is completed, including any period of probation or parole.

Voting Rights for People Who are Unhoused:

- Unhoused individuals in Kansas have the right to register and vote. A valid residence address is required for registration, such as a shelter or other identifiable location where they can receive mail.

Voting Rights for People with Disabilities:

- By law, polling places must be accessible and offer accommodations such as curbside voting, accessible voting machines, and assistance for those who need it. Voters can also request to receive assistance from someone they trust.

Voting Rights for Students from Out of State:

- Students attending college in Kansas have the right to register and vote in the state, using their campus address as their residence. They can choose to vote in Kansas or in their home state, but not both.
